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enough to make it the most frequently occurring ailment?

SENATOR BYARS: Well, I think we've somehow got lost. We don't have crude testing at this point. And if I have misled you or given you information incorrectly, we have very good tests.

SENATOR RAIKES: I think I got misled all by myself, but go ahead. (Laughter)

SENATOR BYARS: We have very, very good testing. And the methods of testing in the handout that are given to you are auditory brainstem response, that's the one that Senator Redfield was talking about, and the audio acoustic emissions test. The audio acoustic emissions test is the first test that's done, it is not the ABR with the electrodes, it's the noninvasive test that's done, and that's what is done now. So we're doing it where it's being done in a noninvasive, very...

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay, but the criterion that you're telling me then that you're putting into place here...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...is just simply the volume? Thank you.

SENATOR BYARS: Correct.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Raikes. Those wishing to speak are Senators Beutler, Jensen and Byars. Senator Beutler, on the advancement of LB 950.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Members of the Legislature, I want to go back to the Excellence in Health Care Fund a little bit. And Senator Byars, as we all know, has been very helpful to this Legislature in bringing forth ideas in the area of health that are really good ideas, a whole number of them over the years. Last year it was, I think, the respite care bill, Senator. And the only reason I bring back that discussion is to bring back the fact that we had exactly this same discussion a year ago.
