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this time that that probably was not the time,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...that we needed to...one minute? I'm sorry, that we needed to spend a little more time, and so for the rest of this year it is certainly my intention and the intention of the committee that we make a concerted effort to come up with the right mix in how we proceed from here. There will be a bill that will be coming before the body that will expand that Excellence in Health Care Council from six to nine, to get a little more geographical representation in the body, or from the state, and then to proceed to work on just what would be the proper mix for this large amount of dollars that this Excellence in Health Care Trust and the Council have to work with. Should this bill come through that process? Should this be funded by that council? Perhaps. I think for this particular year...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time. Thank you, Senator Beutler. And your lights is next, Senator Jensen, if you wish to continue.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you very much, Mr. President, members of the body. I think for this year, I think this bill and one actual before we require a great deal of dollars is a year or two away. Perhaps the Excellence in Health Care Trust Funds could participate in that. Also, I think there are some federal funds that may be available to help us with this particular situation. I just want to digress just for a minute that we were talking about, and Senator Raikes had mentioned how prevalent this test is. One of the questions I asked in the committee, my children were born several years ago, of course, and when we took them back to the pediatrician there was usually a point in time where upon examining the infant that he would turn out of the view of the child and he would (claps hands) do the clap test. And I happened to ask Dr. Brad Schaeffer (phonetic), who's with the University Med Center, I said, what is wrong with that? Is that still being done? And he said, well the clap test is absolutely great for the municipal stadium when the Husker's are playing, but in a doctor's office it's absolutely worthless and it really is not significant enough to do any hearing test on an infant. And of course he spoke very highly for this particular test. I think in future years you're
