are brokers. They're out there and they search. They don't have a car dealership. In other words, it'd be silly to buy it from a car dealership from New Jersey or California and have them ship a vehicle that is on their lot to Nebraska. Shipping costs would just kill you and couldn't afford to do that. What happens is that those people at those Internet sites shop and they have access and bids and they spend their time and they look for people in your area, that's the reason it's important as to where you're from, and then they will find the best deal or, if they can make the deal with you, then they will go to some area, because it's cheaper to bring it over. Senator Chambers made the...asked the question of whether there would be a fee. I don't know what the answer is, but I can't believe there wouldn't be a fee. I mean there's got to be a fee. And so the issue is, how much is that and what do you get for that fee? Is it just merely to help out the dealers here? I don't know if they make a tremendous amount of money on those particular fees, but certainly there's going to be a fee and I don't...I think we ought to get that out in the discussion early on. It may be a matter of how much it is, but it...it will be a fee, but you're probably going to pay that fee anyway if somebody is going to deliver it to you. Now maybe...maybe they say, oh, you know, I'll deliver it to you and there's going to be no fee. Believe me, the car...the price of the car probably is higher. Somewhere...they're not going to, out of the goodness of their heart, deliver a car. Maybe they'd run it across a few blocks over into Omaha, but they're not going to deliver a car to Minden or Lincoln or someplace from outside the state of Nebraska without spending some money, and they'll just have to do that. What I think is interesting about this is that if you...if you get a Nebraska dealer to deliver it, that Nebraska dealer puts...

That's probably the reason this is limited to new cars, because if you did that with used cars I think you'd take a tremendous exposure as to the quality and the representations with new cars. And that's what this thing is designed for, Senator Bromm, as I understand it, is this is solely new cars. That you do...you get the opportunity for a
