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generalities right now, at least I am, on page 17, the language starting in line 1 says: no franchisor, franchisee, or other person shall, directly or indirectly, establish or authorize a separate consumer care or service facility to perform repairs and service, pursuant to the manufacturer's original warranty, on motor vehicles within any community previously assigned to a franchisee without first establishing good cause in the same manner as required for an additional franchisee. First of all, I don't see any definition of "good cause", but that's not my main point here. There are repair shops right now which will fix cars within the manufacturer's warranty. Going to those repair shops does not void the warranty because the level of work that they do comports with that which is required...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...by the manufacturer. By this language saying "no franchisor, franchisee, or other person", that means that knocks me out and I cannot set up a shop to do these repairs. Isn't that true?

SENATOR BROMM: I...I think the way you've set up the situation I think that's true, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, remember, this is discussional with me.

SENATOR BROMM: I understand.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm not expecting any answers final, but to get some things out in the open. Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Dierks, on the Bromm amendment.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Madam President and members of the body. When I was speaking before, I meant to mention the fact that this morning I was on a conference call with state senators from five different states, Nebraska and four others, and it just came up as a matter of interest that three of those states were considering the same legislation that we are today, so I think it's going on across the country. And I'm not sure if the language is exactly the same, but the issue is there. I just
