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to take delivery and pass it on, would that dealer in your town have to pay the cost of getting the car to a franchisee in Omaha of that car for the repairs?

SENATOR BROMM: Well, Senator Chambers, I need to check on that answer because...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR BROMM: ...we're talking about a manufacturer's warranty here and maybe the manufacturer provides that cost. I don't know. But I'll try to find out.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And, like I say, none of these are designed to be trick questions,...

SENATOR BROMM: Yeah.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...but they're difficult areas for me, and my light is on so I will continue when my time comes around.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senators Bromm and Chambers. Senator Chambers, your light is next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Madam President, in case the way I ask the questions may have caused confusion about what I'm getting at, I will make some assertions based on the way I read this language. If you live in a town where there's only one dealer, any new car which may be purchased in another state to be delivered in Nebraska would go through that dealer, unless you're going to have a dealer who lives way far away from you take it. But, in any case, you've got to have a dealer do it. This dealer must tell you, I cannot do any repairs on this vehicle, I cannot do any inspections that are required under the manufacturer's warranty. However, any warranty which is in effect I am responsible to see that it's carried out. So you will select a repair shop or a dealer of your choice who works with your vehicle because, under this bill, we're restricting people to deal with the one who sells that particular kind of car now for repairs under the manufacturer's warranty. You cannot take it to another repairer, no matter how competent. That dealer has to tell you, you select the one to do the work.
