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provide that is that those, that used car dealer, even though they may have some good mechanics and maybe they'll fix the problem, I wonder if you don't void the warranty. And I think that's the reason that you ought to put that in there, at least that was my reading of it. And I'll yield you a little time and tell me what you...how you'd respond to that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Madam President, I'd yield to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Senator Kristensen, I know that if you have an unauthorized person do work it can void the warranty, but this law requires the dealer to put in writing that the dealer cannot provide those repairs, period.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: See, I don't read it that way. I read it that it says the dealer cannot provide repairs or inspections pursuant to the manufacturer's warranty.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Exactly.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: And so...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if there's...if there is a repair of some aspect of the vehicle covered by the warranty, the dealer cannot provide that repair. And if the dealer...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...did, then the dealer is jointly and severally liable to spend whatever is necessary to bring that car up to where it would have been had those repairs not been provided by him or her.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: That's...yeah, okay, I don't read it that it...that that joint and several goes to the repair, but maybe that's a difference in the way we read that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what would it go to?
