grocery that sold it to me. I would go and at least have some recourse because I purchased it from someone locally and they're there. Now, if I really wanted to push the issue, if it was more than just a \$20 card or whatever and I wanted to litigate that issue because my dispute wasn't satisfactorily addressed, I could go into the community where they...where I bought it and file suit. That's not true when you're going to buy a \$20,000 motor vehicle. And where is this point of sale at? If you buy that from outside, let's say that you do buy your vehicle in the state of Iowa and you're close enough you go over, and you have a dispute over the vehicle you physically can go over to Iowa. But if you...and if you're close that's not an inconvenience. Now, you're going to have to access the Iowa court system, but that's probably not all that bad there. There are people that you can hire to represent you in the Iowa court systems and that's not a terrible inconvenience. What happens if it isn't Iowa? What happens if this point of sale that you buy from someone occurs in Idaho? What happens if it's in Florida or California, where most of these inventories or where these buyers or where, excuse me, where the sellers are at? What is your recourse? You can't sue them in Nebraska. They don't live here. Our courts don't extend to them and there's really no one that you can do. You can't go to your local Toyota dealer or your local Ford dealer and demand satisfaction, because they're going to look at you and say, well, you didn't buy it here. And so what this bill does is, by requiring delivery from someone in Nebraska, it actually does give you some ability and some recourse to go back to where the delivery was and said, look, you were supposed to give me a title with this new car, because we're only talking about new cars. You're not talking about used ones. Where's my title? Where is the manufacturer's statement, which is the original evidence of ownership? Where's that at?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: And I didn't get that. I want that. And my recourse is you're the one that delivered. You'll shake this bill in their face and say this law says that you're going to be severally and jointly liable to comply with the contract, and part of the contract was delivery here, correct delivery, to this state to me. And so that's the reason that you see the
