SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...but please understand that I can't make authorized repairs under the warranty. And that could happen, because there could very well be deliveries made many places where they aren't franchise holders.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So a dealer who agreed to do this would just have to do it knowing that he, himself, could be sued for...under a warranty agreement, to see that that work got done, one way or the other.

SENATOR BROMM: That's exactly right.

SENATOR BEUTLER: That's what's intended here. That's what it...that's the way it would work.

SENATOR BROMM: That's the intent.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. (Visitors introduced.) We are discussing the Bromm AM2426 to LB 1018. Those wishing to speak are Senators Chambers and Kristensen. Senator Chambers, you're recognized.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, as I stated before, I'm going to give my view on the amendment then make additional comments, because the main motion before us now is advancement of the bill. But I think there is a good deal that needs to be discussed about it. I am in favor of Senator Bromm's amendment. In order that I can make it clear why I support it, I'm going to restate what the amendment does. Instead of using words that don't have an existing legal definition, Senator Bromm's amendment eliminates that word "responsible" and substitute a word which...or several words that have a legal definition. That, I think, is very crucial to this section, because I think after the amendment is adopted even, there is additional discussion needed to make clear exactly what is being done here and whether it is a wise policy. I will offer an amendment to Senator Bromm's amendment and it will be a serious one, but I'm not going to offer it right now,
