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with conflicts of law in different states, the Uniform Commercial Code. And, as Senator Kristensen pointed out, the contract between the parties certainly means something, and that contract may say something about jurisdiction or forum that's contrary to what we would like, but we have to honor contracts and agreements, we generally do, unless they're unconscionable. So I think there would be legal problems with doing that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But, Senator Bromm, a contract cannot be enforced if its terms violate the law of the state where the contract is entered into. In other words, a person cannot enter a contract that obliges me to violate the law. Would you agree with that?

SENATOR BROMM: I would agree with that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But your view is that if a provision as explicit as the kind that I'm mentioning were to be put into a contract...I meant put into the statute, it would not be enforceable. But I would ask, how are we able to put provisions in law that override provisions of insurance contracts and other contracts of sale? Wouldn't the law be...I'll...okay, Senator Kristensen is looking now, and he had kind of raised that issue.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Kristensen?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: I would. Senator, what I think happens is I don't know that I can put in the law and confer jurisdiction by statute, in other words say all disputes revolving around this transaction will have jurisdiction in Nebraska. What I think this does is give you facts that would lead towards jurisdiction. I'm not being...I'm having trouble articulating it to you, so I'm kind of feeling my way along here. But in other words, what Senator Bromm's bill does is he sets up and says, okay, here are the procedural things that you need to comply with--delivery in the state of Nebraska through a motor vehicle...I think we have the power to declare that. And when a court would look at this, they'd say, well, what are the state law requirements? Delivery has got to be in Nebraska; it's got to be to a licensed motor vehicle...some of those facts...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.
