Chrysler, you had to get a Daimler-Chrysler, and some people say they ain't worth a dime, but anyway I digress on occasion, and GMC, and then some of these other manufacturers of vehicles, so there would be the same kind of competition there that would exist in the fast food industry, where you have Long John Silver, McDonald's, Arby's, Burger King and the rest. That's where the competition is, not between McDonald's here and McDonald's on the other side of town. So although I'm doing a lot of this detail, technical work on this bill, I'm not certain that the philosophy behind the bill is valid. I can understand why those who have car dealerships want to protect their income. But everybody wants to do that. How can we say we're going to protect just one area of the economy and insure them as much as the law can do, that they're going to have a free road toward making money and perhaps the only true competition that could exist will not be allowed to compete? I haven't resolved in my mind to my complete satisfaction how I will vote on the bill yet. I think there are going to be other amendments offered that relate to some aspects of this bill, and maybe elicit some discussion about whether it is appropriate to enact into law a bill such as this. But now let me go back to my amendment, because there may have been an opportunity for people to look at what it is that I'm doing. Remember, brothers and sisters, friends, enemies and neutrals, I don't have any real stake in this bill in terms of the way it's drafted. So if this amendment is thought to take the bill in a direction that those who support it don't want it to go, then the amendment can be rejected and my feelings are not going to be hurt. I'm just going through it. And when I see something that I think is amiss or off the target, then I offer these amendments. Maybe I don't really know what the true target is. So I'm open to being instructed, informed, questioned and whatever else it takes for us to get this legislation, this proposed legislation into a coherent, reasonable form so that when we reach the point of discussing whether or not the bill is wise as a policy, we won't have to say, well, I don't even like the bill because look how this is expressed. The way this is expressed doesn't even make sense. I'm trying to clear some of those side issues out of the way with the amendments that I'm offering. So that's what is before you now. And I say again, any questions that you have I'm prepared to answer.
