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amount of product, that is a way, if McDonald's chooses, to impair the ability of that franchise to make money.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, if they want to, they could...McDonald's I'm talking about now, the head corporation, if it chose, could set up another McDonald's right across the street and undersell every product that that franchise is selling, isn't that true?

SENATOR JANSSEN: If...if the company wanted to do that,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...yeah. But I think it is their policy to sell those franchises...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It is.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...and move their...and move their products that way.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yeah, right. But, see, the means or the method or the style of ownership is irrelevant to what I'm talking about. The discussion on this bill is that the manufacturer should not be in a position to compete directly against a franchisee.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Absolutely.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And my question is why protect the auto dealer when we don't protect the franchise...the franchisee for any of these fast food operations who have actually purchased the franchise? Why don't we put in law that any franchisee who has purchased a franchise or established a franchisee-franchisor relationship, when that has been established, the same things we're putting in law with reference to the auto dealers would apply there, and we protect everybody who is a franchisee. Why not do that?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Chambers, I don't...I haven't seen one of these contracts. There could be the possibility that when
