SENATOR BROMM: I don't...I don't believe they could. I'd have to...I'd want to read the rest of the bill a little bit closer again to...to be able to articulate that. But I...but I don't believe that they could, because...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Does this provision require...does it require all manufacturers and distributors to get a Nebraska license of some type to sell cars in Nebraska, in order to sell by mail or by the Internet?

SENATOR BROMM: Well, if...if they either...they either have to work through a dealer, and it says that a manufacturer cannot be a dealer, except for certain limited circumstances that are on pages 12 and 13. The manufacturer can't get a dealer's license, except for those limited circumstances. So they'd have to go through the dealer. If the manufacturer, I guess, wants to offer...wants to sell cars and not deliver them in the state, I guess there's nothing we can probably do about that, except that, if they're going to be advertising on the Internet in the state, we do have the provisions then, on pages 18 and 19, that would require them to identify consumer sources for those vehicles in the area in which the consumer resides. So, they would...if they're going to establish...it would be in violation of the law if they tried to set up...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...some sort of a dealership on their own, here in the state, without going through...

SENATOR BEUTLER: In the...I'm trying to get distinctions straight here. But in the other part of the law we seem to be saying that if a manufacturer or distributor sold a car out of state for delivery in Nebraska that they could do that.

SENATOR BROMM: If...if...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Is that accurate?

SENATOR BROMM: If...if who sold a car, Senator Beutler?
