prevent teen smoking. They will have one winning proposal in each of those four school districts, but then those four proposals each receive a \$100,000 budget to go statewide with a campaign. So we will have actually \$400,000 dedicated statewide to help with the campaign, whatever that may be that the teenagers come up with, in fighting teen tobacco. I believe that teens do a good job of telling other teens, and that teens listen to other teens on what is appropriate or acceptable behavior, and certainly when it concerns health issues. I have told people, I said it when I introduced the bill in the Education Committee, my motive for this bill was simply what I just stated to you, that I see teen smoking as a huge issue in the state of Nebraska. I would like us to do something. I think that I have long been a supporter. I remember Senator Schimek, in one of my first sessions, had a bill to eliminate vending machines, and I supported that. There finally was a compromise, I think, where we allowed the vending machines to exist, but they have to be within the eyesight of the retailer. Certainly Senator Preister, Senator Robinson and I fought hard to remove smoking on the floor of the Legislature. I have always been opposed to chewing tobacco and those issues that we had here on the floor and supported Senator Thompson's bill on preventing smoking in restaurants. I only tell you that because I've had some question as to...to me as to my motives. Those are my motives. My motives are exactly that. I feel very strong on trying to prevent teen smoking. The bill, I believe, I always thought we would have a discussion with Senator Jensen and members of the Health Committee about how we fund this. The way we fund it is the interest money off the teen tobacco...or off the Tobacco Settlement Fund. And I think Senator Jensen will tell you his office has been very helpful in working with us, giving us information and realizing, though, that I think Senator Jensen, I don't know, but I imagine he's going to express his concerns about dedicating some of the funding from the interest off the tobacco settlement. That's fair, we can have that discussion. We can have the debate on why I think that it's appropriate for us to dedicate a certain amount of money from the interest off of that for a Nebraska plan that does something targeted towards teen...preventing teen tobacco. The...the other, the very same article that I told you, in the U.S. News & World Report, also talks about what we have read and the general public's concern that in a number of groups who have
