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of the heavy resistance of our business and agriculture organizations to what was happening with the Kyoto accords and what was happening with regard to the whole global warming problem. Many of them complained to the federal representatives that this was all a boondoggle, while another side of this argument was it's real and what we should be doing are developing green technologies, getting out there in advance and learning how to do the things that will solve the problem, and be paid for the things that solve the problem; that that ought to be one of the directions of American technology and American interest. And now we see a bill that recognizes, in fact, in the Nebraska Legislature that global warming is a problem and heads in the direction, basically, of using what would be called a green technology--carbon sequestration. And organizations like the Nebraska Farm Bureau are supporting this kind of activity. Well, that's...that's all...I guess we all learn in time to come around to the things that need to be...that need to be done, but there's something instructive, I think, about the debate that came before and now, all of a sudden, not on Senator Dierks' part but on the part of many others, an interest in a problem that was never there before. Senator Dierks, there is one little part of the bill, it's a minor part, but I was interested in why it was structured the way it was and...and interested in whether it might be better to change it a little bit in light of LB 900 which, as you know, merges the Department of Natural Water Resources and the Department...and the Natural Resources Commission, and I'm talking about the language on page 3, lines 18 through 21. It says that, "For administrative purposes, the committee shall be housed in the Natural Resources Commission and the commission shall assist the committee with administrative and operational support." Well, my understanding of what we were trying to do with...with LB 900 was to create one entity and not, as best we can, not perpetuate two different entities and be building them again separately. Would it make any sense just to say that the Natural Resources Commission may advise, because I guess I would like a little more information on how there are two separate housing places. You know, I thought that was one thing we were trying to do, is have everybody housed in the same place, kind of under the same department, and that all administrative and operational support would come from the Department of Natural Resources, not from a newly created...newly created positions that the commission may
