didn't even know existed. And we had already had over 200 boards and commissions that we had...had surveyed. The committee said, well, we better survey these other 118, and so we did the best that we could in spite of the fact that for some of these we couldn't find any information in the Blue Book, the Governor's Appointments Office didn't have any information on them. We just looked in a number of...at a number of different resources for contact information, so we weren't able to find contact information on some and some never did receive a survey. The upshot of all of this was the committee met again in January, right after the Legislature went back into session, and we looked at the list of all of those that we thought then at that time might be fodder for...for "sunsetting" and we went ahead and had a bill drafted to that effect. Meanwhile, we heard from a number of these boards and commissions that we hadn't heard from and the upshot of it was, between the information that we received and the hearing that we did hold on, I think, February 2nd, we have come to you with a list of 19 boards and commissions we feel needed to be sunset. Now I have to say to you that this is a very new process and we were...this is probably only the tip of the iceberg; that we are trying to find our way as far as procedure in the future. And I was just having a conversation with Senator Janssen a little bit earlier this morning and I indicated to him that the committee decided, during the course of its discussions, that if we're talking about policy decisions as to why a board or commission should be sunset, then perhaps we need to recommend back to the committee which handles that particular area that they have some kind of a hearing or do some kind of an assessment of that particular board or commission. I don't think that the Government Committee wants to get into the policy decision-making for these different boards and commissions. We would be happy to have your input into that as to how the process should work. I believe the legislation also indicated that we could ask for a program evaluation of any board or commission that we saw fit to ask for, and we can always do that in the future, but as far as dealing with the information that will be periodically gathered every two years, we probably need some direction from this Legislature. I would also like to say that during the course of this investigation, if you want to call it that, this survey, we discovered that we weren't always asking the right questions, so we very definitely want to revise the questionnaires for the
