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Good point, I...the amendments that are now attached in the bill, with AM0445, if you care to refer to that you can, were drafted with...along with and the help from the Charitable Gaming Commission, and it addressed the conclusions I think referred to by Senator Jensen. And those amendments, hopefully, we thought, cleared the air as it applied to the constitutionality of this bill. Therefore, I would respectfully suggest we do not support the bracket motion.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Lynch. For discussion on the motion to bracket LB 659, Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Lieutenant Governor Maurstad and members of the Legislature. I, too, rise in opposition to the bracket motion. As I have...it's been my experience to watch and look at some of these machines that we're talking about, in my opinion they are...they are less likely to be abused than the hard copies of the pickle tickets are. I'm sure you've all seen what pickle tickets look like. You have to get them from the proprietor of the establishment that is selling them. You have to pick them up at the counter, ask for them, or there are machines now, there are machines where the hard copies are placed into in a...in a stack inside this machine. You put your dollar in the machine and you get out one ticket, or you can put a five dollar bill in and pull the lever and it puts out five one-dollar tickets. You then take the pickle ticket and you rip it off, you pull it off. Then you take the pickle ticket up to the counter and redeem your winnings, if you have any. You can take...or you can put them in your pocket and come back later and redeem them. With this electronic device, you actually walk up to the machine, put your dollar in, take your finger and you go across the face of this machine and it tears off the...electronically takes off the cover over the lemons or oranges or whatever they are. If you have a winning ticket, you are issued a slip of paper, a coupon, that says that you have won 50 cents, 25 cents, a dollar, whatever it is. Then you take this receipt, take it up to the establishment that you're in and you redeem that receipt. You do not build up credits like you would on some illegal gaming devices. You have to play a dollar at a time or a five dollar bill, whatever it is, but you are issued a slip. You take that up to the establishment in the first place there, there in liquor establishments, and you have
