SENATOR QUANDAHL: That is correct I believe.

SENATOR JANSSEN: It would be up to my discretion. It's my establishment. I would be able to say if I wanted one or if I wanted six organizations to line up their pickle ticket devices in there. Is that correct?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I think that's correct.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Okay. So the way you read the...the bill, is it your opinion that this person...that they would have exclusive rights under the bill that we're...under LB 659?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: The way the bill is right now? No, probably not. No,...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Okay.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: ...probably not. But if the Lions Club came to your establishment and had, as a part of their...of providing you a machine so that you couldn't put a machine in that was going to...for the benefit of the VFW or the local baseball team,...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: ...American Legion or anything like that, that would be prohibited under this amendment.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right, but do you...say there were two companies that had these machines and each of them had a particular organization that they were, say, pushing or wanted you to do business with. You could still put both machines in, couldn't you?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Not if there was already a lease or an agreement in place between you...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Why would you want to sign that lease agreement then?
