SENATOR CUDABACK PRESIDING

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Quandahl, would you yield?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let...let us go to the second part of your amendment where we're talking about the equipment. This is the language: "and such equipment shall not be purchased, leased, or rented". That means that if I want to lease this equipment and I want to lease it to sell pickle cards on behalf of one organization, that's all, I cannot lease equipment and do that, can I, if, in the lease agreement, there is a requirement that I do that, under this language?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I believe that's true, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why should the Legislature prohibit me from doing what it is that I want to do? That's what I'm asking you.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: And that's a good question too. When you get down...the basic purpose or I guess the stated purpose of pickles is to benefit charities and what the reason behind this bill is, is that if this new equipment comes into play there's probably a pretty good possibility that some of the charities won't be able to purchase or lease the equipment right away, and so they're going to have to rent it from another source. And it's just...it's my intention or what I intended to do is to just make that available to all charities and not just exclusively to any one particular licensee.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You're trying, Senator Quandahl, to...let me ask a question. Is the emphasis (pronouncing em-pha'-sis) on the last syllable (pronouncing syl-la'-ble) of your name?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I...I think I've...I'll answer to anything that starts with a "Q".
