offering the amendment, cannot be sure what the legal effect of it would be, why should we, as a Legislature, adopt such an amendment? (Hums "Jeopardy" theme song.)

SENATOR QUANDAHL: If I could respond to that, many of the things that we do around here do have differing...I guess, as you point out numerous times, sometimes you don't agree with the legal reasoning put forth by our Attorney General.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The legal unreasoning, but go ahead, I understand your point.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I happen to be an attorney too and so...and many times and one of the reasons why we have courts for a lot of time is to figure out the different...I guess the different interpretations of different language. All I'm saying is, is that it looks to me like this language wouldn't void an entire agreement. It'd be...my argument is, is that it may void a specific clause in an agreement rather than the entire document.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if the clause that is to be voided is the gravamen, or the main supportive structure of the agreement, once that is voided there's nothing of consequence left in the agreement. But here is the question that I would ask now. You would agree that by adopting this amendment the Legislature is buying lawsuits for somebody, because somebody can go to court on it and probably would. Isn't that true? And we don't know what the out...we don't know the impact of this amendment on an agreement of the kind you and I have been discussing, do we?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: It's a compound question. I'll try to answer it though, but...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then let me simplify. Let me to go the language. Such equipment shall not be rented if this proviso is in the agreement. I have rented the machine from Senator Bourne and that proviso is in the agreement. I cannot rent that machine from him because the proviso is in the agreement. This language prevents me from renting the machine. Do you agree with that? If it says it shall not be rented, how can I rent it legally?
