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here, fine. That, you know, but I'm not going to sign a contract with you that that's the only machine that's going to be here. I may want to do something else. Well, maybe that operator would say, well, then I'm not going to do business. Well, that's fine. But if you had a high...if you had a high-traffic business I would imagine that person would take his chances on...on what he wanted to do, if he thought there was enough traffic there or not. And I...I also believe that they would...they would put a sign up that says, you know, and I've seen this and we did have a bill come through...through General Affairs that would say these pickle tickets are...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...supporting the boys baseball team or the VFW or St. Patrick's whatever. So, in my opinion, it should be entirely to that...that person whose building their in or whose establishment they're in what they want to do. If they want to sign a contract, fine. You know, I mean, buyer beware. Then you're going to have to abide by that nobody else's can be in there. That's entirely, far as I'm concerned, this is still free enterprise, you can do darn well as what you want. Be no different if I rented a freezer from someone but if I signed a contract with that person, you know, to keep that freezer then I'm under that obligation. If I didn't, why, I'm not.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Could I have 30 seconds back on my time...just to ask...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Absolutely.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: (Laugh) Thank you. But what I'm...what if...what if the person with this equipment says, I'm only going to allow this to go to one charity and one only? I think that be the risk in this...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...amendment, is that it's going to be they can create exclusivity.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator
