SENATOR SMITH: At the...at the million dollar level that exists. If you look on page 12...well, starting on page 11 of this amendment, it reads: for Fiscal Year 2000-2001 and each fiscal year thereafter, it is the intent of the Legislature, and I'll read the original language, to appropriate \$1 million from the Charitable Gaming Operations Fund if the need for such funds is demonstrated to the Legislature. So we've stricken that and, in that place, we've said that on June 30th of each fiscal year "the money remaining in the Charitable Gaming Operations Fund not used by the Charitable Gaming Division in its administration and enforcement duties", and that equates to approximately \$300,000.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, you're going to have to back up a little bit for me, because I'm not familiar or I have forgotten, I guess, how some of these things work. But the Charitable Gaming Fund, what fund is that?

SENATOR SMITH: Well, the operations fund is gathered from taking a...the state keeping a percentage from pickle card operations, keno operations all around the state, and they have experienced an extreme decrease in revenues as well with the advent of the lottery.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So was there originally an amount of money set aside in that fund for compulsive gambling assistance?

SENATOR SMITH: Not until the '97 action of the Legislature establishing the \$1 million.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So the \$1 million has never been funded in whole or in part in any year?

SENATOR SMITH: That is my understanding, yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: There have been no monies going into it.

SENATOR SMITH: Correct.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. And what is the volume of gambling that relates to charitable organization gambling as opposed to state
