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consideration, so a heap, a barrel and a heap, in fact, of items are put together to be added to one bill. Senator Smith, what you're trying to do I think is worthwhile, but I need to ask Senator Janssen a question or two about this charitable gambling, if I may.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Janssen, would you respond to a question from Senator Chambers?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I certainly will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, is the take going down on charitable gambling and the lottery, or just the charitable gambling?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Both, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Which is experiencing the steeper decline, if you know?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I believe it's charitable. Charitable gaming is the one that's dropping off the fastest.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, do you think that playing with these little pickle cards or pull-tabs, whatever they're called, is as alluring as the glitz and glitter of a casino, where there are bells and bright lights and happy people? Which would you do? Would you sit in a dingy bar pulling little tabs off a pickle card when you could be among all those people where life is really being lived? Which would you do?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Chambers, I would much rather go to...go to a gambling casino, high-stakes gambling, where there are lights, horns, whistles, honks, a lot of people and food available for you to grease up your system with and...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...add to your...ruin your heart and all these things. I would rather do that than go to a local parish hall and play bingo.
