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casino gambling. In fact, there's 28 states altogether that do. But I...I really decided not to get up and get too involved in that issue. That will be coming before us pretty soon. But I was interested in some of the line of questioning that Senator Beutler was pursuing and I would like to give him my time to...if he ways it, to maybe continue talking about the issue. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Lieutenant Governor and members of the Legislature, I'll take it back from the Government Committee, give it to the right committee. But, Senator Janssen, if I may clarify with you, I think we've been talking around this point but I just want it said directly, if I'm understanding it right, and what I'm hearing is charitable gambling net proceeds, hence, assistance to the gambling...Compulsive Gambling Fund, is going down significantly; state lottery going down significantly, hence, the downward trend in the amount going into the Compulsive Gambling Fund from that particular source.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Because of the one percent that goes there. You know one percent...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Because of the one percent.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...of a million dollars is a heck of a lot...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Right.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...more than...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Right.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...one percent of a hundred thousand so...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Smith testifies, on the other hand, that the evidence is that compulsive gambling is increasing dramatically. What do those two factors tell you? What they tell you is, I think, that all the problems from compulsive gambling, perhaps that's a bit of an overstatement, but most of them are not coming from our gambling sources, because those are
