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PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Beutler, your light is on next. Senator Beutler waives off. Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Mr. President, members, I won't take a lot of time here. Sometimes we forget what's before us, we forget the real issue. Many of us think that we're making law here on the issue that's already been decided by the people. I'm actually against...I'm against gambling. It's a good way to lose your money, I've been told anyhow, but it's a good way to lose your money. I'm against it. But we're not deciding that. It's legal. This portion and this kind of keno, the lottery, it's all legal, so our job in here, what we're doing currently, is to try to make it better. And I applaud Senator Smith for bringing amendments like he's doing to try to do this. He's trying to cultivate what we have before us and it's a good idea. It's legal. Even though you may be opposed to gambling, as such, as I am, it's legal, so we're trying to make it better and I applaud Senator Smith for trying to do that in his efforts here and I just support his efforts and I hope you do too. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Senator Smith, your light is the only light. Would you like...well, then, Senator Smith, you're recognized to close.

SENATOR SMITH: Okay. (Laugh) I'm not sure I (laugh)...one minute to Senator Chambers, if he has a question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR SMITH: After that I'll complete my closing.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I want to ask Senator Smith a question. Senator Smith, it is your amendment. Do you think it would be fair for me to announce that I'm going to take a particular course of action and then take it against you when you had no warning of it prior to my making that announcement? Do you think that's fair?

SENATOR SMITH: Of course not.
