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of procedure to defeat something out of this way. Senator Wickersham said that we would be true to our process if we moved the bill along. By the way, I think that means that the people who support LB 1436 should vote for it. They should have an opportunity and I agree with that. I'll be happy to let them have that. So, on that score, I want to...I think I wash my hands of the notion that says we can't debate 143...we can't debate an A bill without that constituting an ambush. No, there are precedents, particularly when it has to do with the flow of money because that's what an A bill is. This is the appropriate place to talk about that. Secondly, here's the two slippery slopes that I think that are here. Number one, we said the Legislature won't do this, divvying up of the trust fund; we're going to have an advisory board to do that. However, even before we have the money in place to use that process, we now are going into the pot...into the pot of money, essentially then using the interest for favorite politically popular purposes. Now that's okay but it's antithetical to the process that we previously passed, and we did that so that there could be planning overall as to those resources rather than piecemeal. We should take the trust fund back and spend it on the floor of the Legislature if that's our goal. That's the slippery slope. There's a second one. I think the argument is that this is with the ambit...this is within the ambit of the trust fund and it is. It's public health; it's legitimate. Let me tell what a problem is, however, and that is the master federal settlement on this kind of money. The tobacco companies specifically got prohibitions against the tobacco settlement money used for youth oriented videos of a certain kind, in fact the very kind that produced success in Florida. This money has a string to it, and the only money that Nebraska has that would have a string to it, a censorship string to it, is this kind of money in this settlement. If we took the money from any other source, the kids would be free to use any kind of videos that they wanted. It's only because we take money from this source that there are now strings on what the kids could do on videos, and that's a slippery slope as well. You're entitled to a vote on LB 1436 without shenanigans in the form of amendments or brackets or whatever, but it is not inappropriate to consider the implications of spending money in an A bill on the floor of the Legislature at this time.
