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of freedom. When a person is in confinement, other people have control of that individual. Other people make decisions about what that individual may or may not do. The welfare of that person has been placed into the keeping of others. It is bad enough when things happen to adults under those circumstances which things ought not to happen. But when they happen to children, then it's difficult, at least for me, not to take that into consideration when an issue is before us that relates to that type of matter. I haven't decided exactly what I'm going to do on this bill, other than that I have no intention of making this body go to cloture on a bill such as this. If there were to be legitimate discussion, by that I mean where people are interested in what this bill is to do and questions exist which need to be answered, that is what my colleagues consider to be legitimate discussion. I consider anything I say on a bill...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to be legitimate discussion. But I'm going to listen very attentively to what Senator Thompson says and to what others may say on this bill and, as we proceed, I'm sure that I will have another question or two. But I had to get out of the way the acknowledgement that I must make that even when we are old and have hair that is turning to gray, if we are intelligent enough to realize that people younger than ourselves may know some things or have a point of view that can benefit us and we, therefore, will not close our minds, we can continue to learn.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Wehrbein, on the Thompson amendment.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, Mr. President, members of the body. I'd like to ask Senator Thompson, one more. I don't know...
