

TRANSCRIPT PREPARED BY THE CLERK OF THE LEGISLATURE  
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SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the Bar Association, the legal profession, and I intend to continue doing it. It's just that I don't have enough time and I'm not in a position to drop every thing and jump on every case immediately, but I take them as I can get to them. And when it comes to ethical and disciplinary proceedings, there is no statute of limitations, contrary to what some judges and lawyers think who have not mastered the law and studied it to the extent that I have.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to indefinitely postpone. Senator Brashear, as primary introducer, would have the option to lay the bill over.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. President, I'd like to take it up. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, to open on your motion to IPP LR...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: ...291CA.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, and members of the Legislature, I will not seek a vote on this motion but I already stated that there is some things that I want to get into the record, and I will do it by way of a motion or two rather than fiddle with the bill...the proposed constitutional amendment because what Senator Brashear is offering, and as Senator Matzke, and Don Pederson, and Bromm pointed out, it's eminently fair. Because a salary cannot be increased during a person's term of office, a judge is considered to not have his or her term of office ended so that, and if he or she is going to stay in that office, or an increase can occur until a judge, at that particular level, stands for retention, or some such nonsense as that. But I would like to ask Senator Brashear a question. This is on the constitutional amendment and the real issue.
