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that's true. Is the lawyer's obligation to the courts, or is the lawyer's obligation to justice and to the client, whom the lawyer is ethically bound to represent zealously? Whether a person is a mere lawyer or an exalted judge, that person is held to a higher ethical and professional standard than anybody else in society. So it seems that those who believe in the Bible would hold to that principle that where much is known, much is required. But in this society where judges are involved who have that awesome power, they also are allowed to get away with things that an ordinary person could not get away with and ought not be allowed to get away with. Suppose, as happened with some of these women who were the victims of these judges, you, who are women, were situated where you are a single parent, where a judge would tell you, you've got a minor child to rear, and if you go forward with this complaint, you can lose your job and how are you going to take care of that child? Let the judge put that on you. So you say this is in court, this is the fountainhead of justice, it's a fountainhead. It's poisoned or contaminated. Every thing that proceeds from it picks up the contamination. So you sit there and you're scared to death because you've been conditioned as a woman, prior to getting this job anyway, that you don't count for anything. You walk behind the man, he treats you any kind of way he wants to, but you got a little bit of education, got you a little old job as a court reporter, and you're trying to make a way for yourself and your child and have a degree of independence, but you still carry that lack of self-esteem, that self-doubt about your work, and when the judge fondles you and takes liberties with you and tells you that you can lose your job and you can't take care of your child and your state pension is going to be jeopardized also, where can you turn? Well, you go to the ones who are supposed to protect you, and you go to the Judicial Qualifications Commission and you say, this judge has done these terrible things to me, but he says if I go through with a complaint, I'll lose my job. And you're told by the court administrator and higher judges, we're not in a position to protect your job and, in fact, you can be fired. Now how is that woman to feel? Should she file a complaint when the one she is complaining to tells her he can take your job? How much confidence would she have in them doing the proper thing on the complaint? So she swallows spit, she goes back to work.
