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think I want that to be a thorough debate, that we understand what we're doing, and that this body make what it deems to be the right decision on both issues. So I will be doing that at the appropriate time. I'm a little bit...I guess I'm a little bit perplexed about how to deal with this today because of the time limitations. So I guess we can just take it as it comes. But let me...let me just go on another few seconds or a minute or so about the philosophy behind the original LB 1285 and the ability of the Public Service Commission to issue fines. Through the last summer, fall,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...even...even the last year and a half, I would say, there's been considerable discussion in the industry and with the Public Service Commission and our...our...our committee has had interim study hearings. And we have been, as conscientiously as we can, trying to determine what adjustments, if any, needed to be made in order to allow the Public Service Commission to do its job. And the original LB 1285, with the proposed \$10,000 fining authority, came out of discussions with the industry and with many members of the industry supporting this proposal as a thing that probably needed to be done, a thing whose time has come. And so I think that it is an appropriate suggestion, and I'll look...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BROMM: ...forward to the debate. Thank you, Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Bromm, to open on the committee amendments.

SENATOR BROMM: One second, Senator Cudaback?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Just one second, Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Cudaback, I think we have an 11:30 time to move to a different subject, and I think it would be easier to follow, for the body, if we would wait with the committee amendments until we've taken up the next item of business, if
