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to remain exactly the same with this bill, as far as this 45 percent maximum on property tax?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So, what is the difference? That's what I'm asking.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Under current conditions this bill would lower the reliance on property taxes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If this bill were advanced.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: That's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So the aim of this bill is lower property tax.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And place a greater burden on the state to make up the difference.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, if this bill is passed, then people would argue that the state ought to stick by what the Legislature promised in enacting this bill.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Wickersham. I just wanted that stated succinctly, and those who followed the discussion know that. And anybody would be less than wise, if the language of this bill were enacted into law, not to argue for it at a future date. No future Legislature can be bound by a prior Legislature. We cannot even be bound this session by what we've done earlier because, if we choose to repeal anything that we may have passed and the Governor signed, we can do that. If we want to amend any bill or any law, we can do that as long as this session is operational. So there cannot be any limit placed on what we can do, as long as we're operating within the
