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have to decide in our own minds where we are, what that determination is. Certainly if we get into rougher times, if sales and income tax via state aid of course does fall off, are we going to share the grief with local entities, particularly schools in this case, or will we suffer all of that ourselves and have to fight it out on the budget? And I see that as the philosophical discussion here as much as anything. The details are being discussed in great detail. I think that's very good because we need to understand what this formula does. But the bigger question really is when things start falling off, Senator Janssen brought it to my attention, when are land values going to start falling off? I don't know whether they are anywhere in the state of Nebraska at this point. I know they've dropped a little bit modestly; it's difficult for me to know. In my area we have strong land values because urban people want our land very much. But in farmland I assume that things aren't going to necessarily get bigger or better, and Ted Turner wants more land, which has driven up the prices in many areas. But the real question is to me is our commitment to property tax relief to the extent that if we lock in at 45 percent, which I...my only problem with that, I don't know how magical that is. If other states are at 40 percent, Kansas at 30 percent, that's certainly a worthwhile goal. Whether that fits Nebraska I'm not sure. There's a lot of changes going on across the state. Local districts are losing...someone just told me this morning how many less students there are in the district, a very small district. That's going to put even increasing pressure on local districts. But once again we've had a history of property tax support of local schools. Many want that because it gives more control. And so I don't know how far we should go. I guess I'm wandering around here because I don't know exactly where we should go either. But I think the body needs to look at it in that case, in a philosophical issue. But I do know there will be great gnashing of teeth in here if we have to maintain a 45 percent or 55 percent, excuse me, 55 percent support in state aid in a mere three or four years, perhaps, because our economy falls and our revenues are going to be down. Our revenues are staying strong, you'll find, as you know from the revenues last Friday, the Forecast Board, and it will be reflected in our budget. We are going to be somewhat lucky, if you will, that our revenues are going to be supportive of where we're at,...
