all set out in 75-136.01, which refers to the section we're amending here, so there is...when you get into the Court of Appeals or the Supreme Court you always worry about a great amount of time coming along and...before you can get a hearing and that sort of thing. Sometimes that's the case. But in district court, in this kind of a matter, I can assure you that you would get a prompt hearing and if they requested a stay of the fine the court would entertain a prompt hearing in that respect. If there was a bond, the court would set that bond appropriately. So the mechanics and the procedures are there. They are...they are well set up and I think it's a...it's a very legitimate and a very fair process. But let me say that, number one, I'm going to again say in our hearing on this bill we had no strenuous objections. You might see a couple names down there who testified in opposition, but I have the testimony and I'd be glad to show it to you and the testimony was along the line that we would like to see...we would like to see some ability for the fine to be based on the severity of the violation, thus, the committee amendment. And the committee amendment which ties into this language on page 3 that I spoke about, the severity of the violation, compromising or mitigating any penalty prior to a hearing if the parties agree, determining the appropriateness in light of the gravity and good faith of the violator, tying into that language was the one objection that the Telephone Association expressed in their testimony, which I will be glad to furnish that copy to anyone. So we really didn't hit strenuous objections to this...to this particular part of the amendment until, at least on my part, until Monday of this week by US West, and I'm...I've listened to them. I've spent hours...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.
