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some specific instances or a case or anything like that, that you could point us to, that would I guess help...help me in making a decision on this? Why do we need this particular provision at this time?

SENATOR BROMM: You know, Senator Quandahl, I won't...I won't beg off a hundred percent, but we have not...we have not asked the PSC to give us names and specific illustrations. We have talked in terms of the problems they face, the problematic situation of trying to enforce an order against a company that grosses \$473 million a year and \$1.3 million a day, how do you get them to do what they're supposed to do in terms of connecting up the other companies that want to connect with them and that kind of thing. I will, however, before closing, see if there are some more specific cases that I can illustrate for you, because that's a very good question. And I won't take all of your time, but that's...we've been talking in terms of principles and powers and problematic situations. I have not asked them about specific cases.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: (Inaudible) I do have, I guess, one more question too. I do have the fact sheet that the PSC was sending around also and one of the things that I picked up on, and Senator Landis alluded to it too, is that it does appear that other states to have fining authority, but I see in here it looks like at least two other states have fining authority but that doesn't...I guess are there more than just two other states that have this fining authority?

SENATOR BROMM: Several states that can administratively fine in...and I'm...right now I'm going to talk about the US West territory because that's very much in our bailiwick on this discussion: Iowa, Minnesota, Colorado, you mentioned Minnesota perhaps, Arizona, New Mexico you mention, Oregon and Washington. And that's just in US West territory. I haven't...I don't have it right at hand information beyond that territory, but I'm sure we can...we can find that at some point in the discussion.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Okay. And I appreciate your responses to the questions too, and I don't want to belabor it, but I just noticed in the short time that I've been here that sometimes the absence of opposition is giving (sic) for a reason to...I guess
