lands. That would have expanded it. That would have opened it way up, Senator Jensen. That would have meant that there were places in Lincoln and Omaha and all across the state where you could possibly have casinos. We wrote this very narrowly. We said it only applied to the tribes who are federally recognized tribes in Nebraska. Even if a tribe was able to take in more land, it would have to be contiguous to the reservation on that land to have a casino on that land. The changes are "zilcho". The compact would address issues that are of concern. I agree, Senator Jensen. That was the best word I could think of at the moment. (Laugh) The compact would address issues like, I mentioned awhile ago, that age limitation over in Iowa. I don't want 18-year-olds going into casinos. It should be 21 years old. I think we could address...I mean I know we could address issues like that in the compact. We could address issues like infrastructure and jurisdiction and all those revenue issues. All of that kind of thing would be the basis for negotiation. There's a low population base in the part of the state that we're talking about. We're not talking about huge casinos going into these places. There just isn't the population base to support huge casinos. Senator Jensen, do you mean to tell me that there's never been any problems in casinos run by white people? I mean there are always going to be some problems, I guarantee you. There are always going to be some problems that are present in casinos. We are surrounded by four states: Colorado, South Dakota, Iowa, and Kansas. All four of those states have compacts with their tribes. We are totally surrounded, and I think Senator Beutler very aptly pointed out...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...on discussion on another bill the other day that there is very few...there are very few places in Nebraska that are very far from actual gambling. In closing, I would like to say that I visited the Santee Reservation on President's Day and I had never been in that casino and I had never been to that school and I saw how the money was being spent on playground equipment for kids, on sidewalks, simple things like sidewalks, for instance. I saw the health center, which is funded in part by casino. I had a retired carpenter from Crofton come over and say to me, you know, I've got a wrestling
