PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Landis. Further discussion, Senator Kristensen.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Senator Bromm and I are working on some parts of this and the arguments are going to roughly run like this. The issue is once there is an order entered, where do you go? Do you have a chance for a meaningful chance at the stay? And we're looking at the TERC statutes, and so until I do that, Senator Bromm, I want to look at that before we address that issue, but here's the issue. Is there a chance for a meaningful stay? The Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court are not trial courts. They are not evidentiary courts. Day in and day out they are not going to want to act like a trial court, which hears evidence, which takes evidence in and makes preliminary rulings. They hear appeals. They look at records, they examine records and decide how they should decide the case. And the issue that we need to resolve, and I think that Senator Bromm is willing to work on and that all of us are, is, is there a chance for a meaningful stay in this case? Because you can listen to Senator Landis' story and if you've predecided that that's who you want to win, that makes a pretty logical result. What happens if that decision isn't right? What happens if that decision was wrong? You do have a right to an appeal. I sue Senator Bourne in court and I get a judgment against him. He
