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SENATOR BROMM: ...with respect to the Liquor Control Commission and orders entered in the Liquor Control Commission, and whether or not those orders are automatically stayed by the filing of an appeal from those orders?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No, in my opinion, Senator Bromm, they have to ask for a stay. They would have to request a stay.

SENATOR BROMM: So the order would go into effect in the absence of a stay granted by the district court or the process.

SENATOR JANSSEN: District court, they would have...

SENATOR BROMM: Yeah.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...to ask for a stay.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you. Is Senator...Senator Schrock, would you yield to a question?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Schrock.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Schrock, with respect to the Department of Environmental Quality and in that area that you are familiar with as Natural Resources Chair, if an order is entered by the Director of DEQ and there is a party affected who doesn't like that order and they appeal, does that order go into effect or is that order held in abeyance by the appeal?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Bromm, it's my understanding that that order goes into effect and stays in effect until it is overturned by a court or until DEQ changes their own ruling.

SENATOR BROMM: There is...there is, I am sure, a possibility of a stay granted by the court during that process, is that not correct?

SENATOR SCHROCK: But it has to be granted by the court.

SENATOR BROMM: Right. And I would like to ask Senator Jensen if he would yield to a similar question in the health and human services area.
