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company is very circumspect in watching after its interests. Why, if I don't keep my end of the contract, which I always do days in advance, I would probably get a notification, gentle at first, but with a mailed glove inside of a velvet glove, not a steel fist. Well, a mail glove is one of those metal ones that got all these spikes and bumps on it, so that if you hit somebody up side the head it will go through one side and come out the other. So a mail glove inside of a velvet glove is more to be feared than a steel fist in a velvet glove. But I'm sure that those of us who have an interest in this bill want to be sure that whatever we put into the law is going to accomplish the purpose that we intend to accomplish with legislation such as this. I have found myself getting increasingly involved in some of this complex legislation which I had nothing to do with introducing. I'm...I was working with Senator Engel on his drunk bill. And he's lucky I'm a man who keeps my word, because I'll continue to work with him because my word was given, even when somebody has violated his word to me. I don't feel that I have that kind of flexibility and looseness of reliability, because however people treat me, they're going to know what I intend to do when I give my word. Now prior to the giving of my word, they may not know what I'm going to do, because me and General Patton have this in common, General Patton and I. I know it's for others to find out. And just as they found out from Patton when the time came, they'll find out from me when the time comes. And while I'm on the matter of being sure that the law says what it means, that it means what it says, we should, not just in bills like this but especially these where we're dealing with technical issues, strive for precision and clarity. Some of the language is probably never going to be read by a layperson. But there will be lawyers looking at and rummaging through, trying to find a benefit for a client. That's what lawyers are hired to do. So what we, as lawmakers, should attempt to achieve in legislation of this kind is an understanding of what it is we want to get done. Then we should look at the language we select to see if it does it. And that's what that discussion on Select File, I think, should involve itself with. By adopting the committee amendments we put the two main elements into this bill, in fact they have become the bill. The first deals with that fine, the civil penalty that can be up to \$10,000 a day for each violation, until the violator brings his or her conduct into conformity with that
