

TRANSCRIPT PREPARED BY THE CLERK OF THE LEGISLATURE
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LB 921

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that which shall be, but may not necessarily be. But you and I understand each other, right?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: We do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I have no problem with this amendment, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Brashear, there are no further lights on, did you wish to close on AM2612?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. President, members of the body, having managed to come this far (laugh), I urge the adoption of AM2612 for all of the technical reasons that I previously discussed. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You've heard the closing on AM2612 to LB 921. All in favor of the passage please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted who care to? Record, please, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Brashear's amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: AM2612 is adopted to LB 921. Mr. Clerk, next item.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Brashear would move to amend with AM2613. (Legislative Journal page 875.)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Brashear, you're recognized to open on your amendment.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the body, AM2613 is also in fact another bill which was heard by your Judiciary Committee and all eight members were present and unanimously advanced the bill. Under current statutes, the statute of limitations for most torts is four years. However, under Neb. Rev. Stat. 25-208, the statute of limitations for certain intentional torts is one year.
