questioned any of the others, they knew he was ill because they were the ones through their medical persons who sent him home, and I don't think that is fair.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time. Senator Chambers, you're recognized to continue.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'm going to go ahead and put up my standard motion even though there won't be time for it to be considered, but this is one of those bills which if it could be discussed and if changes could be made in it, something worthwhile perhaps could be achieved this session. But if the things were to be done on this bill that I think ought to be done, it would take more than 15 minutes just to discuss it and set people's minds at ease on what it is that is attempted and to answer any questions about why such a change in policy would be undertaken. And I'm sure that all of us have voted to put bills on the floor with the intent of trying to amend them once they got out here. So I will terminate my discussion and let the motion be read.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to indefinitely postpone LB 915. Senator Vrtiska, you would have the option to lay that bill over, Senator.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Vrtiska, would you like to lay the bill over?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Yes, I'll lay the bill over.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: The bill is laid over. Mr. Clerk, next item.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next bill is by Senator Bruning. (Read title of LB 918.) The bill was introduced on January 5 of this year, referred to the Banking Committee, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill at this time, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. Senator Bruning,
