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explains Section 2 by saying that this Section 2, that is, would amend Section 76-1702 of the Nebraska Time-Share Act to provide that the definition of "offering" means any offer to sell, solicitation, inducement, or advertisement by "any means of communication," and not just by radio, television, newspaper, magazine, or mail, and to repeal provisions which provide that any offering of a time-share interval which is not located in this state shall not be an offering if the offer states that the time-share program is in compliance with the law of the jurisdiction in which the time-share interval is located. If there is a problem with these time-share arrangements and somebody is going to run a scam, and the way to avoid having a problem with these offerings is to simply state that the program is in compliance with the law of the jurisdiction in which the time-share interval is located, that would readily be done. Every time people send something through the mail or any other means of communication, whether it be these things mentioned or by carrier pigeon or pony express or covered wagon, that person is going to assure the proposed victim that this is on the up-and-up and on the level. You can see it in every type of offering made for whatever product, whether it's magazines, or anything else, and there are sweeteners provided to get people to get involved in these scams. I don't know that anybody has brought a bill to protect some of these elderly people especially and others who get these facsimiles of checks in the mail saying so-and-so is the winner of this large amount of money. Some people have traveled clear across the country, I mean literally from California to Florida, to collect that money, and one such old person was on television. It would seem to me, and I'm speaking as one with not a lot of information about these time-share situations, that more ought to be required than a simple statement that the time-share program is in compliance with the law of the jurisdiction in which the time-share interval is located. If it were not, then it is clear that the whole scheme is really a scam, and if it's a scam, the person who is doing the scamming is not going to tell you this violates the law of the state where it is taking place. So that is not very helpful. If the only purpose for having that done is to create a basis for liability, then the liability would come from the fraudulent aspect of the whole scheme itself. But if putting that kind of a statement into one of these offerings would allow a person who is conducting the scam
