Then below them you see a second set of eyebrows and eyes. Then when you look below the mouth you will see a second mouth; below the bottom of the nose, a second nose. There are two faces here. I did not contrive the picture and this individual took out after my esteemed colleague, Senator Hartnett, because he had yielded time to me to speak on occasion, which he had done. But on this bill I cannot let it go simply because he had yielded me time, because old Patton put the fear of something in my colleague (laugh), and this is what the rhyme says:...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...Study, I did, to learn what caused Hartnett to turn, his hatches to batten, a foe, Doug Patton, has handed Hartnett heartburn. Paul and I have kind of laughed about this in the past, but it gives you an idea of the tactics employed by some people who are attempting to unseat some of our colleagues. Well, I got my light on, so I won't take the last few seconds here.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, you may continue.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Again, this bill seems relatively innocuous, but if it were of any significance it would have been prioritized, and it probably wasn't even introduced...oh, it was introduced this year. Some of these bills were not. And I'm sure the group who wanted it would not be harmed that much if it's not advanced and not passed, so it is going to go the way of those other bills. And I'm sure my colleague, Senator Hartnett, would not want me to treat his bill any differently from the way I've treated the vast majority of those predecessor bills, and I borrow that word "predecessor" from his bill, which talks about predecessor agencies. In subsection (4) on page 2 we find the amendatory word, and that would cause the section to read in the following manner, if all amendments were to be adopted: Physician assistant means any person who graduates from a program approved by the Committee on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs or its predecessor or, which is the new language, successor agency and the board, who satisfactorily
