right. Thank you, Senator. Members of the Legislature, when a state statute is going to be tied into a federal provision there is a way that that has to be done to prevent it constituting an unconstitutional delegation of legislative authority. When reference is made to a federal act, it is to that act as it exists at the time the legislation is put in place. Such references can be made. If that is not done the statute, as drafted, would be delegating to the federal Congress the authority to change state law by changing the particular act that was referenced. And when you're talking about a federal law or any law, the word that you use is "compliance". "Accordance" might be a popular jargon type word. I'd like to ask Senator Aguilar a question, a general question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Aguilar, would you yield?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator, is this language based on language from another state, the language in this green copy?

SENATOR AGUILAR: I think the language is based on the federal program, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, no, I meant the bill itself.

SENATOR AGUILAR: From the state of California.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So this is the language that they have in their law.

SENATOR AGUILAR: It's not exactly the language, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, who changed...what changes exist between this bill and the law in California, if you know?

SENATOR AGUILAR: We can get that information. I don't have it at this time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, who made the changes that were made, if you can tell me that?
