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with. But if it's...if it's either residential or nonresidential the only other thing might be institutional, and institutional is there. I don't really see the difference between in-home and residential, so what would the difference between those two be, if there is a difference?

SENATOR AGUILAR: I don't know that there would be a difference. I'd be happy to work with you on changing that like you want to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, just so you understand that I have real issues. Now, when we make references to this federal language, let's say, on page 2 again, if we go to lines 11 and 12, where we're talking about the National and Community Service Trust Act of 1993, then we give the cite, "42 U.S.C. 12651 et seq." Suppose that language is amended? Then it is not at that day what it would be at the time this bill passed. Is that true? Congress can amend that or repeal it, can't they?

SENATOR AGUILAR: I'm sure they can, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if it's repealed then this law would not have anything to be based on, would it?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Probably not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And this is why if you make a reference and say at the time...the way it existed at a certain time whatever Congress does or doesn't do makes no difference because you have fixed the part of the definition or whatever the standards are that you're accepting. The same thing would be in lines 20 and 21: 45 C.F.R. part 2151 (sic--2551). Now, is that a federal statute or regulation, if you know?

SENATOR AGUILAR: I cannot answer that question.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if it were to be revised, repealed or amended, then the standards that are specified...this language says, in the green copy...let me back up and start over again. The language in the green copy at page 2, in line 20, says we're talking about individuals...services provided to these individuals specified in this section. If that section is expanded by Congress and additional services are provided...
