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what it is, is a hope, because I don't think there's any basis for an evaluation that \$200,000 will do it, and that...that concerns me a lot. It concerns me that there is no sunset to this, not that we have a great record of abiding by sunsets, but there isn't any end to this program. It's just something that will continue and I would well suspect that we'll end up that this program could get into the many more hundreds of thousands of dollars than are anticipated at the present time. Now apparently...Senator Aguilar, if you would yield to a question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Aguilar.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Have you consulted at all with the AARP in connection with this program?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes, we've talked to just about every aging...

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Do they support the program?

SENATOR AGUILAR: ...agency there is. Yes, they do.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: I'm sorry?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes, they do.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: You say they do support the program? That was not the information that I'd received. But the next thing that I was concerned about is you have mentioned that the...there's a need out in the state for this type of program and I would like you to tell me where in this bill it refers that any of the money would go to the "nonserved" areas. I don't see anything in the bill that says that it will go out into the state, which you've alluded to.

SENATOR AGUILAR: Well, what I'd say about that is, like I said, Health and Human Services is going to decide where the grants are going to go to and since that's where the need is I guess I'm going to assume they're smart enough to send it that direction.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: And you say the need is there because the Lincoln and Omaha programs are funded by federal funds. Is that
