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program. If each person who is going to be paid under this program has to work a minimum of 4 hours a day, 4 days a week, that's 16 hours. I believe 4 hours a day for 4 days a week, that's 16 hours. Now, if you divide...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time. Senator, you have spoken three times on this, but there are no other lights.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: I would recognize you to close.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Before I lose my train of thought, if you divide that 100,000 hours by 16 hours, that 16 hours constitutes a person; 100,000 divided by 16 comes to about 6,000 something 50 hours, 6,560 hours or 650 hours. Anyway, let me say 6,500 hours. That would be 6,500 people or 50 people, whatever it is, a little over 6,000 people who can be employed under this program if none of the money goes for any other purpose. What they ought to do is draft this language so that it restricts the expenditure of this money and the operation of this program to those parts of the state which are not served by any of these kind of programs. But if, as Senator Aguilar has told us, in his district, there is a program that his main city, Grand Island, has, and he wants to give them some money. Then he wants them to be able to get some of that money, which would mean an area already served. But in order that I don't misstate, let me ask the senator a question. I would like to ask Senator Aguilar a question?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Would you respond?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Aguilar, did you say that there is one of these programs in Grand Island?

SENATOR AGUILAR: No, I said there was a Grand Generation Center in Grand Island, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What would they have to do with this because I misunderstood then.
