SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...just gets rid of some surplusage which says "but not limited to." Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: You've heard the closing. The question before the body is the adoption of the Chambers amendment to LB 1101. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Have you all voted who care to? Please record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Chambers' amendment.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: The amendment is adopted. Anything further on the bill, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, I believe there is. Senator Chambers would move to amend, on page 2, line 21, strike the language "but not limited to."

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to open.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, that first, that amendment that we just adopted dealt with these various categories of persons to be served and I felt that the listing was so all-encompassing that we did not need those words "but not limited to" because that language would mean that individuals who were not afflicted in the way that these in the list are afflicted could, nevertheless, get these services. Now I am on page 2, and in line 21, they are talking about these services being provided in a variety of settings, and we have this construction, "including, but not limited to." I would strike "but not limited to." Here is what would be left, and if anybody can think of a setting other than these, then maybe the amendment should not be adopted. This is what would be left: residential; nonresidential, that includes the whole world, in a sense, right there; institutional, that means if it's neither residential nor nonresidential, it seems to me if it is nonresidential, it's probably institutional, but I leave in nonresidential, institutional; and in-home settings. To me the term "residential" includes in-home. So I think there are other words that could be eliminated. I don't even know why you have to give the listing. If the purpose of this is to deal with
