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were...if I had a concern about that and I had...and I was driving in Omaha, I think I'd...I think I would be concerned about that if, in fact, their convictions are coming under...under an ordinance rather than Iowa law. I don't think that should let them off the hook, so to speak. Rural...rural areas are generally always going to be convicted under state law, I think. That's been my observation at least, but in your cities, you're lots of times going to have that other option, and should we...we're carving out a lot of things we're not going to be able to use here anyway because I think we have to. I think legally we have to omit something that would not be a conviction under our laws. If it's a conviction under .08, we can't use it, and I understand that. So there's going to be a lot of stuff we're not going to be able to use, and I don't know...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...I don't know if we should give this one away, Senator Chambers, and just say carte blanche we're not going to consider city ordinance convictions. I'm not...I'm not yet convinced of that. So as I speak right now, I'm not planning to support this amendment unless I become more convinced. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Chambers, and this will be your third time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, I assure you I'm not interested in anybody getting off the hook. I'm interested in a law, whose sweep we're going to broaden immeasurably, be done in such a way that it will be administered fairly. Senator Bromm mentioned that a prosecutor may know something about an individual or come into information about this person's background, and maybe so, but that's not what we ought to rely on when a law is to be enforced. We should not rely on a prosecutor happening to know something about this individual or that individual, especially in the society where certain groups or individuals come under closer police scrutiny. They were talking about driving while black. After what happened to Amadou Diallo in New York, they are talking about breathing while black. And as former Senator
