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to advance it to Final and then pull it back, if we do find that answer, then go back to Final, or do we just not advance it to Final? What are you exactly asking?

SENATOR BROMM: That...that...

SENATOR HILGERT: I mean, I'd certainly say yes to working on it, but...

SENATOR BROMM: It was...I wasn't necessarily making that decision, I just thought that at the juncture we're at in the session that it would make sense to advance it and work on the solution, pull it back, we find the solution and attach the amendment by agreement. But if we're operating in good faith, I would hope that would be possible. But I'd ask Senator Chambers how he might feel about that as well, if he would yield.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I'll yield.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Chambers, would...would...does the description of how I'm suggesting we try to approach a solution to this, does that seem like that would be acceptable and under those conditions would you be agreeable, if there were enough votes here, to advance the bill while we work on the amendment?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What I would rather do, Senator Bromm, and I don't want to hurt anybody's feelings, I'd rather we leave the bill where it is. That would encourage everybody to not let a lot of time pass, and we'd get to work on it while it's still fresh on all of our minds. The bill, is it a priority bill?

SENATOR BROMM: Yes, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It's not going to lose any place, and I don't see the need to advance it. And to be quite frank, I don't even trust this system anymore. I'm not saying you. If it was your bill and you told me that you would promise to bring it back, your word is as good as gold with me, and I'm just being blunt. I don't feel that way about everybody on this floor now.

SENATOR BROMM: Well,...
