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Speaker, but this morning I need to do that. First of all, he...he's right and he's wrong. First of all, he said that I had a 1960 television set, and I do, but it's in my basement. I'm storing it because in ten more years it will be an antique and it will be worth a lot of money. (Laughter) But I do have a slightly newer model than that, that I'm using. And if I'd...I called my wife this morning to make sure if she could tell what year it was, and she thinks it might be in the 1970's, so I've caught up a little bit. (Laughter) So I just wanted to make that correction for the record. And as I said, Senator Kristensen is right in one sense and in another sense he's wrong, because I'm not using that old set anymore. Getting away from that issue more directly, I would like to ask Senator Kristensen a question, if he would respond.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Kristensen, will you yield for a question?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: I would. Senator Vrtiska, under that theory, is your wife going to put you in the basement for another ten years and (laughter)...

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, we're not going to delve into that right now. (Laughter)

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Okay.

SENATOR VRTISKA: My...my serious question, Senator, is...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...and I've been thinking about this issue, since it came up yesterday, quite seriously. And one of the problems that I have is we're talking about mandates, and I understand that. But I got to thinking about that. You know, Senator Byars, if he gets his way, is going to mandate that we have seat belts because the government has said we'll lose money if we don't. Now does that mean we ought to reimburse the people who have to buy those? I mean I'm trying to think where this could lead to, if you start talking about when something is mandated. I think Senator Schrock is going to get his bill, or is going to try to get his bill passed so we'll have to use
