the same speech Senator Matzke gave. I hope I can keep that median in this area. I don't want the only stations to be in the eastern part of the state. I want them all to be able to continue. It's tough. This is a profound, difficult mandate that they're going to have to live by. They're going to have to change their method of doing business so dramatically that for those ten entities out here maybe some of the well-heeled ones will stay, but I'll guarantee you some of the smaller ones, it's tougher. And the comment that they're not going to pay any taxes at all, that's not true either. You know that. They pay income taxes. They pay employment taxes. This is for a short period of time, for three years of purchases where they're going to get a rebate where they...they don't get it automatically, they've got to have it directly and primarily for their use in the switch to digital, so they're not going to be able to slop a lot of other things into it, and they're going to have to go to the Department of Revenue and jump through that hoop with the Department of Revenue, who has the Telecommunications Act and they've got a set of hoops that they jump through. This is the toughest exemption that has ever been proposed in the Legislature. It's the tightest one and it's got a short sunset date on it. What about those of us that say, well, this is...this is going down the slippery slope and that a case-by-case doesn't make any difference?

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: You go buy a sandwich. Go down here and buy it in the vending machine downstairs. Going to pay sales tax. You go to the grocery store and you buy the bread and the cheese and put your sandwich together, it's exempt. We make case-by-case all the time. The slippery slope is not an argument. Those people are going to come to the Revenue Committee, it's the toughest committee in the Legislature to get exemptions and any sort of process through; they're discerning. They've made a good choice here. They've made it tough, but the Revenue Committee is not a committee that pumps things willy-nilly out, because they are. As you look at this today, this is one that so profoundly changes, it so impacts those smaller broadcasters who are not the major affiliates, they need some assistance for a short...
